Stroke neurologists Dr. Bijoy Menon and Dr. Andrew Demchuk. Stroke study helps identify best treatment for clots

The Calgary stroke team has published another important study into ischemic stroke treatment this time in the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA).

The Calgary-led study found that, depending on the composition of the clot and where it is located in the brain, administering tPA can be almost as effective as thrombectomy, given sufficient time.

The team collaborated with 11 other centres in five countries and included 575 patients.

Their findings will help inform physicians which treatment will work best for patients.

Her abstract "Single-cell level comparison of histopathology and


