Equitable Care for People Who Experience Disabilities

Person-First vs Identity-First Language

Person-first language emphasizes the person, not their disability. People with disabilities vs. disabled people. Person who uses a wheelchair, vs. wheelchair bound. People have different **preferences** as to what they would like to be called.

VS

Ableism

Social prejudice and discrimination against people with disabilities and advantaging those who are able-bodied. Conscious or subconscious.
