Reducing Transfers From LTC to ED

An initiative is underway that uses RAAPID to put ED MDs in touch with LTC care docs prior to the transfer of a patient from LTC to an ED. The initiative is designed to utilize community paramedics and other resources to reduce unnecessary transfers and to clarify the goals of necessary transfers. Invasive Group A Strep

Two important points regarding puerperal sepsis with **Invasive Group A Strep**.

1. Have a heightened awareness of this illness including the fact that it can present with vague symptoms ([see the document here](#)) for presenting symptoms, we might miss if V and D are attributed to viral gastro)
2. We have a responsibility to wear PPE (especially a mask) when providing care at or near the perineum at the time of delivery or **within 6 weeks post-partum**. There have been documented cases of a caregiver transmitting Group A Strep to a patient (Confirmed by DNA analysis!) and causing Invasive GAS with serious morbidity and even death.

Suicidal Ideation and Non-Suicidal Self-Injury by Children and Adolescents:

Preparing Emergency Departments and Urgent Care Centres for the implementation of School-based Protocols to address SI and NSSI

Recently, two protocols were developed for schools across Alberta – the [School-based Suicidal Ideation Response Protocol](#) and the [School-based Non-Suicidal Self-Injury Response Protocol](#). These were created in collaboration with various AHS departments, school authorities, and community-based services. The protocols aim to:

- increase mental health capacity in schools
- help school staff direct students to the most appropriate resources based on the student's level of risk
- decrease the number of non-urgent presentations to emergency departments
- improve the experience of young people and their families, and
- improve coordination between schools and healthcare settings.

While using the protocols is voluntary, it is expected that numerous school authorities will adopt these protocols in the 2019-2020 school-year. It is important for Emergency Department/Urgent Care staff and physicians to be aware of the use of these protocols and associated documents.

Most importantly, AHS physicians and staff need to know that school's adopting the protocol will be using an [Information Transfer Form](#) (listed as Appendix C in both protocols) when sending children/adolescents to the Emergency Department or Urgent Care Centre. This standardized form outlines the mental health related observations of school staff. This information can help healthcare professionals in their assessment of risk and determine whether a referral to Psychiatric Emergency Services or other mental health supports are needed.

A copy of the Information Transfer Form is attached as well as the Frequency Asked Questions related to each protocol.
