Declined referrals project

New Guidance: Balloon Tamponade for Variceal Bleeds

Just a reminder that the Linton gastric balloons for variceal bleeds have been discontinued and have now been replaced by the Blakemore balloons (which have both a gastric and an esophageal balloon).

Please see attached the new **Resource** provided by the Department of Critical Care Medicine outlining safe placement of the Blakemore (and Minnesota tubes - should you somehow find

yourself encountering one).

Pleases note that Critical Care **does not recommend inflating the esophageal balloon on the Blakemore Tube**; however they have provided basic instructions for inflation, should it be deemed necessary. Please see the screenshot below:

BALLOON TAMPONADE FOR VARICEAL BLEEDS- ADULT RESOURCE

- 8. The DCCM- Calgary zone recommends the esophageal balloon is left deflated to reduce the risk of esophageal ischemia, necrosis, or rupture. If it is determined the esophageal balloon is to be inflated, attach a sphygmomanometer device or pressure gauge device to the esophageal balloon port. The ICU Attending, Critical Care Resident, Gastroenterologist, or Nurse Practitioner should gradually inflate the balloon to 25-45mmHg. Use the minimum amount of pressure required to create tamponade (and not exceeding 45 mmHg).
 - Discuss with MRHP frequency of ongoing esophageal pressure monitoring (order required).

Journal Club Summary

February 2025

Overview:

The Sudbury Vertigo Risk Score is a 7-item risk score designed to predict serious diagnosis (stroke, TIA, vertebral dissection or brain tumour) in patients presenting with dizziness, vertigo, or imbalance. The 7-items include male sex (+1), age > 65 years (+1), diabetes history (+1), hypertension (+3), motor or sensory deficit (+5), cerebellar deficits (+6), or clinician's diagnosis of BPPV (-5).

Bottom Line: The 7-item Sudbury Vertigo Risk Score had a sensitivity for a serious diagnosis (stroke, transient ischemic attack, vertebral artery dissection or brain tumor) of 100% (95% CI, 97.1% to 100%) and a specificity of 72.1% (95% CI, 70.1% to 74%) for a score <5. Using a score of >4 to define a high-risk group that warrants further investigation would reduce CT use by 10% and would not miss any serious events at 30 days. However, this risk score has not been externally validated and did not assess key clinical variables previously shown to significantly associated with the outcomes being studied (e.g., nystagmus).

March 2025

Overview: In this prospective multicentre study with over than 19000 children enrolled between the two cohorts, two PECARN clinical decision rules were validated. See the **Summary Link's** last page for an overview of the rules and inclusion criteria.

Bottom Line:

- The PECARN blunt **abdominal trauma rule** (all ages < 18 years) had a **sensitivity of 100%**, NPV 100% for injury requiring acute intervention.
- In children < 2 years, the PECARN minor head trauma rule had a sensitivity of 100%, NPV 100% for clinically important TBI.
- In children > 2 years, the PECARN minor head trauma rule had a sensitivity of 98.8% and NPV 100% for clinically important TBI. The 2 children misclassified for the head trauma were admitted but did not require surgical intervention.

Both rules are great as a "rule out" approach to minimize un-necessary CT use in children with blunt abdominal and minor head trauma.


