



Measles

<u>Canada is currently experiencing an increase in measles activity</u>, with recent cases reported in Quebec and Ontario that are associated with <u>ongoing outbreaks</u>. Measles is also circulating in some areas of the US.

If deemed <u>susceptible to measles</u>, children 6 months of age or older and adults (including those born before 1970) can access free <u>measles vaccine</u> if they will be travelling to or through areas where measles is circulating in Canada or travelling to any country outside of Canada.

Note: Infants younger than 12 months of age may not respond sufficiently to the measles
component of the vaccine in part due to the persistence of maternal measles antibody;
therefore, any MMR-containing vaccine dose administered before 12 months of age should
be repeated at 12 months of age or older with appropriate intervals between doses.

You can get the vaccine by contacting your <u>local public health or community health centre</u> or by calling 811.

RSV Vaccine Eligibility - Age Change

RSV vaccine eligibility has been expanded to include community dwelling adults aged 70 and up (previously 75). Those 60 and older living in continuing care or who are Indigenous continue to be eligible. The current recommendation is to receive only one dose of this vaccine.

Rapid Syphilis and HIV Testing

Rapid syphilis and HIV antibody testing is available at the acute care APL Laboratory at the Peter Lougheed Hospital. This is a screening test with quick turn around time. Confirmatory gold standard testing with higher specificity should also have been ordered. If support for community-based follow-up is required, please contact STICS (1-855-945-6700 option 4).
