COURSE INFORMATION/DESCRIPTION OF THE COURSE				

We will explore how the financial community views and values biotechnology business opportunities.

Handling the financial side of the business requires both an understanding of concepts and the skills to do the analysis. This module will help students understand some of the issues surrounding the investment process and to be better prepared when interacting with potential investors.

We will learn how to read and analyze financial statements, estimate and forecast cash flows, and value investment and financing proposals. The pedagogical approach used is to learn by doing. This is a very busy course. The course consists of cases, lectures, exercises and examinations. You will have deliverables nearly every meeting.

Required readings, pre-readings (PR), slide decks, various practice problems, and cases are posted on D2L. **COURSE OBJECTIVES/LEARNING OUTCOMES** 

The objective of the course is not to make you a financial specialist. The emphasis is on understanding the financial issues and options available and learning only the most basic analytical tools for dealing with them. The three financial implications on which we will spend our time are: profitability, financing needs, and risk.
