

Using GenAI: How Much is Too Much?

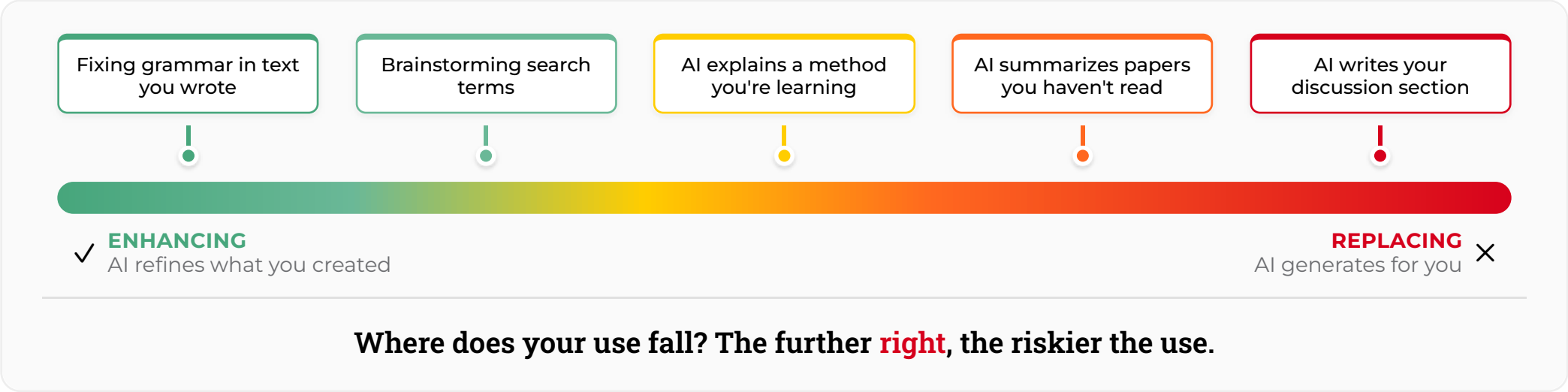
A thinking framework for GenAI use in graduate studies



THE CORE PRINCIPLE

GenAI should **enhance but not replace** your academic work.

The AI Assistance Spectrum



Five Questions to Ask Yourself

1 THE ORIGINALITY TEST

Did the core ideas come from me?

Your thesis, arguments, interpretations, and conclusions should originate from your own thinking and analysis of the evidence.

Ask: *If I removed all AI contributions, would the intellectual substance remain?*

2 THE DEPENDENCY TEST

Could I produce this without the AI output?

If the AI output disappeared entirely, could you recreate the substance from your own knowledge and skills?

Ask: *Am I using AI as a shortcut or as a crutch?*

3 THE LEARNING TEST

Did I learn what I was supposed to learn?

Graduate school develops specific competencies. If AI performed a task for you, did you miss a critical learning opportunity?

Ask: *What skill was this assignment meant to build? Did I circumvent that with AI?*

4 THE EFFICIENCY TEST

Am I using AI for efficiency or capability?

There's a difference between speeding up what you can already do versus having AI do what you cannot.

OK: *Faster editing.* **Problem:** *Writing I couldn't have produced myself.*

5 THE TRANSPARENCY TEST

Would I show my supervisor exactly how I use it?

If you would hide, downplay, or feel uncomfortable disclosing your AI use, that discomfort is a signal.

Ask: *Would I want to share my exact prompts and outputs?*

Quick Reference: The Hard Lines

WORK TYPE	THE BOUNDARY
Candidacy / Field of Study Exams	Any GenAI use during the exam ZERO TOLERANCE*
Thesis Defence	Any GenAI use during the defence ZERO TOLERANCE*
Data Analysis Seek Supervisor Guidance First	Analyses and interpretations must be yours
Thesis Writing Seek Supervisor Guidance First	The written thesis must be your own work

*Such use may be considered a breach of academic integrity and subject to Academic Misconduct procedures.

THE BOTTOM LINE

Ask Yourself: "Can I explain and defend every aspect of this work to my committee?"

If your answer is **no** → you've used too much AI.

When in doubt: Ask your supervisor first. Get written authorization. Document your use.
