COURSE INFORMATION/DESCRIPTION OF THE COURSE

Students will be introduced to the standard components of a Business Plan for a biotechnology startup company developing a new product or service. Biotechnology business plans contain sections that describe: 1. Executive Summary; 2. Technology Approach, Product & Differentiation; 3. Intellectual Property; 4. Licensing and Partnering Strategy; 5. Financing Plan; 6. Regulatory Aspects; 7. Clinical Trials; 8. Manufacturing Strategy; 9. Sales and Marketing; 10. Human Resources Plan; 11. Exit Path and Strategy; and 12. Valuation of the Company. The students will observe how the Business Plan is translated to a Corporate Business Pitch and then develop their own pitch presentation, which will be delivered first to the Instructor and fellow students and subsequently to the members of the local biotechnology business community.

COURSE OBJECTIVES/LEARNING OUTCOMES

The students will be introduced to the elements of a written Business Plan and a Corporate Business Pitch. The students will learn why the various elements are important to include in these corporate documents and what level of detail reviewers or audience members expect. The students will also develop facility with presenting a complex yet integrated business pitch to a knowledgeable audience.
