COURSE INFORMATION/DESCRIPTION OF THE COURSE

An overview is provided of the primary business aspects underlying the health care product development industry. In developing a business, it is important to both define and differentiate between the technological approach and the product itself. Consideration is given to the intricacies of company creation as well as to financing the business. Further development of the company requires an understanding of issues related to intellectual property and licensing, regulatory and clinical affairs, sales and marketing, corporate partnerships and investor exit strategies. The principle objective of this course is to develop a general understanding of how these various aspects integrate to form a functioning business, thereby setting the stage for the deeper inquiries into specific topics that are the subjects of other MBT program modules.
