Classes will take place synchronously over Zoom. On most days, students will attend from 9:00-10:15 , followed by a smaller clinic with a preceptor from 10:30-11:45. Prerequisite/Co-Requisite

Medical Science 203 and admission to the BHSc Honours program.

Course Description (from the University Calendar)

Students will develop their critical thinking skills and their ability to write logically, well-argued research papers. Students will learn the fundamentals of logical reasoning as well as how to analyze theoretical issues in science, medicine, and philosophy.

Overarching Theme

Students will attend a series of lectures and more interactive “clinics.” The first few weeks of lectures will focus on arguments. Students will learn how to recognize, analyze and evaluate arguments. Developing these tools and techniques will prepare students for a series of lectures on different conceptions of health and disease and will help with students’ writing assignments. Each student will be placed in two clinics, where they will read and discuss papers on a focal topic selected by the clinic preceptor.

Global Objectives

- 1) Students will further develop skills of reasoning and academic writing and deepen their understanding of conceptual issues in health science.
- 2) Students will learn how to recognize and evaluate arguments, use evidence to draw conclusions, consider objections and formulate replies.
- 3) Students will analyze and write about academic papers on a range of science and medicine-related topics.

Learning Resources

All course readings will be made available through D2L.

A Note regarding readings

A list of required readings will be outlined on D2L and links and documents will be made available, where possible. Required readings have been chosen carefully to inform you and enhance the lecture material. **Students are REQUIRED to complete assigned readings BEFORE each lecture.** Instructors will proceed in class on the assumption that students have read completely the assigned readings. Students should be aware that many of the readings they will be assigned may be of an unfamiliar nature and style. Students should allot sufficient time to allow for several reads of the assigned material.

Learning Technology Requirements

Brightspace (by D2L) is located on the University of Calgary server and will be used extensively for communication with students. **It is the student's responsibility to ensure that they receive all posted communications and documents and that they receive emails sent by instructors or fellow students through D2L.** Only your @ucalgary.ca email address may be linked to D2L. A student's final grade for the course is the sum of the separate assignments. It is not necessary to pass each assignment separately in order to pass the course.

Analysis #1: A short (maximum 400 words) paper articulating the argument made in your first clinic's 3rd reading.

Analysis #2: A short (maximum 600 words) paper articulating the argument made in your second clinic's 3rd reading and developing an objection to that argument.

Term paper proposal: Your proposal (maximum 700 words) should identify your research question or problem and explain how you intend to address it. In particular, your proposal should answer the following three questions: (i) What is the general topic area? (ii) What are the main views on the topic? (iii) What question or problem in this topic area will be the focus of your attention?

Term paper: An in-depth investigation (max 2500 words) on a topic arising from the second clinic

Quiz 1: This quiz will test students' grasp on argument analysis and evaluation. The quiz will take place on D2L. The quiz will be designed to be completed in 1 hour. However, students will have 90 minutes to answer all questions. In order to reduce the chance that students will share quiz questions (which will otherwise not be known until a student commences their quiz) with classmates, we have opted to run these quizzes at a fixed time. The course instructors acknowledge that some students may have difficulty taking an examination at a fixed time. This worry is offset by the fact that classes are offered synchronously and so students normally will need to be available during fixed hours each week. If for some reason you cannot make it to a fixed time assessment, please get in touch with your course instructors in order to make alternative arrangements.

Quiz 2: This quiz will test students' grasp on different conceptions of health and disease. The quiz will take place on D2L. The quiz will be designed to be completed in 1 hour. Reading quizzes: There will be 7 “reading quizzes” to be completed on D2L. Each quiz will close the day before the class session for that week, except for the quiz on April 1. Each student’s lowest score will be dropped and will NOT factor into final grade calculations

A Note regarding Writing Assignments:

Writing skills are important to academic study in all disciplines. In keeping with the University of Calgary's emphasis on the importance of academic writing in student assignments (section E.2 of 2020-21 Calendar), writing is emphasized, and the grading thereof in determining a student's mark in this course. The Bachelor of Health Sciences values excellence in writing. Competence in writing entails skills in crafting logical, clear, coherent, non-redundant sentences, paragraphs and broader arguments, as well as skills with the mechanics of writing (grammar, spelling, punctuation). Sources used in research papers must be properly documented. The University of Calgary offers a number of instructional services through the Students' Success Centre's Writing Support Services (<http://www.ucalgary.ca/writingsupport/>) for students seeking feedback on assignments or seeking to improve their general writing skills. Students are **strongly encouraged** to take advantage of these programs.

Missed Components of Term Work:
