As part of this process, the Health & Society curriculum has been mapped - there have been many substantive changes since the last mapping exercise in 2012, thanks to the contributions of many CHS faculty. In addition, I will be also be mapping the various assessment strategies used in Health & Society courses. This process is an opportunity to reflect on the state of the program and to create a road map for the BHSc program to continue to be a flagship program for the University of Calgary.

2017-2018 Academic year intake

We are in the midst of reviewing student admission applications for the Fall 2018 intake. The supplementary application was revised last summer by the BHSc Directors to refresh the intake process and to ensure that we are selecting students who fit the vision of the BHSc program. We are excited to see the results of this intake cycle using this updated application. Many thanks to the CHS faculty who participate in this process as application reviewers.



Public Health and Preventive Medicine Residency Program – Update

Admissions

A new file review process is being piloted this year, with positive early impressions from the admissions subcommittee. Nine candidates are being interviewed for PHPM's 2 positions on January 15th and January 29th. CaRMS Match day is March 1st, 2018.

Exams

Residents completed national coordinated oral and written examinations in December. Written exam scores were shared between PHPM programs for the first time this year with UofC results being similar to those of other programs.

Resident accomplishments

Dr. Grace Salvo successfully defended her thesis "A mixed methods approach to identifying barriers and supports to physical activity in adults following residential relocation" under the supervision of Dr. Gavin McCormack.

Curriculum

A strategic review meeting with PHPM core rotation preceptors is scheduled for February. The aims of the meeting are to review changes to field rotation curriculum currently being piloted, discuss processes for resident assessment, and share information/identify priorities for 'meantime activities' in advance of PHPM's transition to Competency by Design model of training in 2019-2021.

Important Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada Employment Regulations Affecting International Students

International graduate students must be enrolled full-time and have a valid study permit in order to work legally in Canada. There are no legal restrictions on how many hours international students may work on-campus. There are strict regulations governing eligibility to work off-campus. For off-campus work, an international student must: (1) Be a full-time student enrolled in a UC graduate degree program (exchange and visiting students are not eligible for off-campus work); (2) Have a valid study permit; and (3) NOT work more than 20 hours a week, all year long. Please note that graduate programs (except some MBA programs) do not have scheduled breaks built into the program. International graduate students are therefore unable to work off campus more than 20 hours a week at any time because they are continuously enrolled full-time for the 12 month registration year, regardless of whether they take a course or not.



Graduate Education Program

Thesis Submission

Approval of thesis submissions to the Vault may take 7-10 business days due to high volume of submissions. Please allow for additional processing time for graduate degree completion letters after the thesis submission is approved.

Student Funding

Students should be identifying and applying for all scholarship/awards/funding opportunities for which they are eligible, with the expressed support of their supervisory team. Failure to do so may affect student ability to receive program-recommended awards. It is the responsibility of the student and supervisor(s) to determine which awards and funding opportunities the student is eligible for.

PhD Guaranteed Funding Policy – UPDATE

Regular monthly discussions at the Faculty of Graduate Studies Council Meetings have continued regarding the requirement that programs develop and implement a funding policy consistent with FGS Policy. Each program is being supported in developing a funding policy that is transparent so that students know where their funding is coming from. The CSM will implement a single funding policy for our graduate programs and MDCH will be given a transition period. It is expected that the new policy (likely effective September 2019), may include a minimum stipend amount for PhDs (e.g., \$23,000 per year), maximum stipend amount (e.g., \$30,000 per year), and criteria about GATs. No numbers have been finalized and further updates will be shared as they become available.

MDCH Doctoral Candidacy Requirements – UPDATE

Thank you to those who supported and/or provided feedback regarding the candidacy document circulated in November 2017. Revisions are currently being incorporated, with the intent to present to the FGS Policy Committee, so as to receive the necessary final approvals over the next few months.

NEW!! MDCH Program-Specific Evaluations

Based on student and faculty feedback, we implemented program-specific course evaluations in December for our Fall 2017 offerings. This will continue for all courses in Winter and Spring 2018. In addition to regular University of Calgary Universal Student Ratings of Instruction (USRIs), students will complete a program-level evaluation form assessing course content and TA instruction. We hope that this data may be used to further inform our curricular review, as well as offer specific, concrete, and timely feedback for the professional development of our educator teams.
