From the Department Head

Frontline Staff Meetings

Together with Bruce Swan, the Executive Director for Mental Health, I have started to visit all the programs, clinics and services within our Regional Mental Health Program. In addition, I have been attending the site medical staff meetings in the Department of Psychiatry across the Region. These meetings reveal a large number of fairly specific clinical service related issues, but also a couple of themes are already emerging. First, despite a plethora of organizational changes, the Mental Health Program and the services it provides has survived intact, with perhaps some bumps and bruises on the way. These changes have included every level of the organization. Two Regions have merged, Alberta Mental Health Board services have merged into regional services. The senior regional portfolios have moved around and we are now

in the Northeast regional portfolio. The Program Directors have been reduced in numbers. The Managers have been reduced in numbers and their roles have changed.

Provincial Mental Health Plan

All of these changes not withstanding, the Mental Health Program has the potential to grow within the framework outlined in the recently released Provincial Mental Health Plan. This is more of a framework than a plan, because each Region is required to put forward its own regional plan. According to the Provincial Mental Health Plan, we have one year to prepare this regional plan. In the meantime, we have developed proposals for transition funding from 2004 to 2007. Transition

funding is designed to help us move from our current set of services to a more comprehensive Have a good summer through

> based funding formula. We are also working to provide recommendations on a populationbased funding formula, which would start in 2006.

Strategic Growth

In addition to the proposal for transition funding, the CHR Board has asked the Mental Health Program to submit a strategic growth initiative for Mental Health. This outlines the general direction for growth over the next five years. It will be reviewed at the last meeting of the Board before the summer in June. The proposals call for significant increases in overall funding. They also call for balanced increases across the continuum of care.

Recruitment

The Department of Psychiatry is continuing to grow each year. We are looking forward to recruiting all of our current PGY-5 residents. We are negotiating with

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
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Residents' Corner

As mentioned to the examiners in the spring round of practice exams, there will be changes starting next year to the final exams.

The responsibility for the long interview will be given to the individual residency programs. Fifth year residents will have to successfully pass two sequential interviews in Calgary within their final year. The written exam (usually in late April) will remain unchanged. The PDM (Phenomenology, Diagnosis & Management) stations will be expanded and hosted exclusively by the RCPSC in Ottawa in early June. Due to the increased emphasis on home programs to examine, I plan to organize an examiner's workshop prior to the November practice exams.

I would also like to welcome Unit 45 at the Rockyview Hospital as a new Inpatient residency rotation. As the program expands, it is important to enlarge the teaching pool to meet both the junior and senior needs for inpatient experiences. At the spring retreat, the residents recognized the efforts of the staff on Unit 25 for their energy and enthusiasm; the Silver Couch Award will be given to Drs. David Gibbs, Clint Hirst and David Tano at the Fall Social Meet 'n Greet on October 1. Combined with the experienced staff on Units 21, 22, 27 and 49, we now have six excellent Inpatient units for teaching.

As we all begin to practice our swings for the upcoming departmental golf tournament, I'd like to acknowledge the support of the faculty & support staff to the program. In addition to the donations and sponsoring of the eleven or so residents, I would also like to extend my thanks for your ongoing support to our program.

It is a very positive sign when Pauline receives unsolicited calls sometimes on a weekly basis from across Canada inquiring about transfers into our program. The last few years have seen a lot of changes to the program. Each change has meant innumerable man-hours of planning, discussions and revisions before they become incorporated into the training. It is rewarding to note that changes are recognized across Canada as well as in Calgary.

Before I close, I would like to introduce our upcoming PGY-1 residents: Cristin Fitzgerald, Ursula Hines, Jessica Lyons, Katalin Mayer, Reilly Smith and Barb Urbanska. Five of these students are from the University of Calgary and the sixth has spent considerable time on clerkship electives while in the U of A medical school. All of these new residents will spend one month in Emergency Psychiatry in the first half of the residency year, followed by two months at one of the six Inpatient units. Please join me in welcoming your potential new colleagues.

Enjoy the summer and we'll "talk" in the fall.

Forensic Psychiatry

The past year has been a busy and exciting time for the Forensic Psychiatry Division. We look forward to an expansion of services in the coming year to meet ongoing heavy demands. In order to meet this demand I am pleased to report that the division has successfully recruited 3 new psychiatrists to work in various program areas:

Dr. Cynthia Baxter, well known to many of you as a resident in the Department of Psychiatry, is completing her training and will be joining the division to work in the Forensic Assessment and Outpatient Service (FAOS). Dr. Baxter also has an interest in transcultural psychiatry.

Dr. Yuri Metelitsa, an experienced Forensic Psychiatrist, will be returning to Calgary to rejoin the Forensic Division. He will commence work in FAOS and at the Correctional Centres and will join us at the Southern Alberta Forensic Psychiatry Centre upon expansion of inpatient services in 2005. Dr. Metelitsa was a senior

psychiatrist in Moscow for a number of years, and in 1995 did a fellowship in Forensic Psychiatry in Calgary. He is currently practising at the Alberta Hospital Edmonton and is Director of the Division of Forensic Psychiatry at the University of Alberta.

Dr. Waqar Waheed has recently completed a fellowship in Forensic Psychiatry in New York and will be joining us in the Forensic Adolescent Program. Dr. Waheed previously completed a fellowship in Child & Adolescent psychiatry. He recently married Dr. Seema Hussain and will be joining her in Calgary.

I am confident that our robust mix of highly trained and experienced Forensic Psychiatrists will provide ongoing strong leadership within the Forensic Division.

Over the next year you will likely hear of ongoing developments with respect to the Southern Alberta Forensic Psychiatry Centre. In this regard the Forensic Division is preparing to shift our inpatient services from the Peter Lougheed Centre (Unit 38) to a freestanding Forensic Psychiatry Health Centre in the North West quadrant of the City. This will allow for achievement of a number of critical objectives including increased service capacity and closer to home assessment and treatment of patients in Southern Alberta. The initial transfer of service will see an increase in Acute Assessment and Treatment beds from 20 to 29. Subsequently we plan for the addition of 29 Forensic Rehabilitation Beds and 12 Forensic Adolescent Beds. This will not only increase our current capacity, but also provide a

broader range of services not previously available in Southern Alberta.

In closing, I would like to comment on the ongoing importance of a productive and collaborative approach between Forensic and General Mental Health Services. On behalf of the division I would like to thank all of our partners in General Mental Health that have played critical roles in advancing our service and providing support to our patients. In turn, we will continue to provide specialized Forensic Psychiatric support to our partners in General Mental Health. It is our intention to continue to foster these linkages which are so vital to the needs of our common patients.


What's in A Name?

In the last few months, a working group that was struck by the Mental Health & Psychiatric Services Executive Management Team has been working on proposing appropriate nomenclature for Clinics and Services. Many people are confused with terminologies such as "program," "service" or "clinic", and we are proud to be one of the first Departments within the Calgary Health Region to finally come out with a policy in naming clinics and services.

This policy, first of all, stipulates that each Clinic or Service should be descriptive of what it does in order to facilitate appropriate referrals to their service. This description could be the diagnosis or population served, age, location, among others. For example, the hospital based Clinics would be more suitable to more acute patients, while the Community Clinics would be more appropriate for the less acute. The term "Program" is now reserved for the broader five Divisions/Programs of the Psychiatric and Mental Health Services (such as Forensic. Geriatrics, Children, Acute Care) under which are the individual Clinics, Services, or Teams.

Furthermore, this policy also aims to emphasize wellness rather than disease. As a result of this policy, many Clinics in the Specialized Services Program have come up with more meaningful and informative names such as those illustrated on this page. This policy will hopefully promote clear, consistent communication among the different services as well as the public.


A Journey of Understanding Through Art



Mr. Brian Pawlak's Bronze Sculpture is entitled "Samson". This was inspired by his parents, Greek mythology, as well as the Bible, which depicted the prophet whose strength emanated from his hair, which when cut by Delilah, resulted in despair and powerlessness. His strength eventually returned when his hair grew back, an analogy to people who are able to overcome their mental illness.



Opportunities for Psychiatrists in Rural Mental Health Clinics



The Mental Health and Psychiatric Services Program, Calgary Health Region operates Community Mental Health Clinics in several rural centres within the Region. Each clinic has full and/or part-time clinicians, and psychiatrists function in a consultative role to the clinic on an episodic basis. Psychiatrists who assume these positions report being pleased with the variety of work and there generally is a low turnover rate.

At present, there are TWO opportunities for psychiatrists to provide adult consultation to rural clinics:

Strathmore Mental Health Clinic - one full day per month

Airdrie Mental Health Clinic - 2 half days per month

Psychiatrist remuneration is on a fee-for-service basis according to the Schedule of Medical Benefits. The clinic staff coordinates patient appointments and there is a definite demand for psychiatric consultation. Each position is supported by a sessional budget for travel time and mileage to and from the clinic. Each clinic opportunity is quite flexible regarding which half or full day slot during the week would be available.

Eligible psychiatrists must be privileged (or become privileged) in the Department of Psychiatry, Calgary Health Region. However, it is important to note that psychiatrists who have the majority of their Regional Mental Health & Psychiatric Services work located outside of the City of Calgary are exempt from the mandate to do on call duties.

The three psychiatrists on Unit 25 at the Peter Lougheed Centre, Drs. David Gibbs, Clint Hirst and David Tano, were


chosen as Teachers of the Year by the residents. They will receive the Silver Couch Award at the Fall Social Meet & Greet on October 1.






LASTEST NEWS: ALL RESIDENTS PASSED!
