# PATIENT-REPORTED OUTCOMES (PROMS) IMPLEMENTATION IN YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH

We conducted a project to select a PROM for youth mental health clinical care, by engaging with youth, families, and clinicians to make the use of PROMs more person-centred in a clinical setting.

# PATIENT EXPERIENCE & PATIENT-REPORTED EXPERIENCE MEASURES (PREMS)

2024 saw two published manuscripts from patient experience/PREM data. The first was published in <u>BMJ Open Quality</u> and focused on the association between person-centered quality indicators (PC-QIs) and unplanned acute care use. The second focused on the experiences of Albertans who were hospitalized due to diabetes and was published in the <u>Canadian Journal of Diabetes</u>. Additionally, our collaborators presented work on hospital noise and the experiences of children hospitalized due to cystic fibrosis and sickle cell anemia.

We recently had an article accepted about using natural language processing to understand patient-reported in-patient experiences from free-text comments, to appear soon in JMIR Medical Informatics.



#### IMPLEMENTING PERSON-CENTRED QUALITY INDICATORS (PC-QIS) IN PRIMARY CARE IN ALBERTA

We started this year off by completing our first Interim Report to the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Alberta, the sponsors of this research project. The AbSPORU Patient Engagement Team supported the research team in recruiting 9 members to a **Patient Advisory Council (PAC)**, which would support the activities of the research team for the PC-QI project.

The project was initiated with the four University of Alberta, Department of Family Medicine Teaching Clinics, with significant support from the Director of Health Services. In August, our partners at the HQCA distributed the PC-PREM survey to over 13,000 patients of the UAlberta Teaching Clinics. Just over 3,000 patients consented to participate, for a 23% response rate. PC-QI PAC Members completed the PC-PREM in October and provided the research team with high-quality feedback about their experience with completing the PC-PREM.

We presented a poster at the <u>CAHSPR 2024 Conference</u>, held in Ottawa, detailing our learnings about collaborative research partnerships, and the key role they play in implementation. The co-chair of the PC-QI PAC, the Research Coordinator, and Dr. Kimberly Manalili co-presented on the PC-QI project at the <u>Fall 2024 Person-Centred Care Forum</u>, hosted in Calgary.

#### **What Next?**

The Research Team plans to expand in the New Year by welcoming a prospective Master's student and two additional staff members.

We are now in the pre-implementation phase with the Primary Care Networks in Grande Prairie and the Central Zone and is planning for surveying to occur in clinics starting in January. Post-implementation efforts with the UAlberta Teaching Clinics will commence in December, leading into the New Year.



## PATIENT & COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT RESEARCH (PACER) HIGHLIGHTS



The Patient and Community Engagement Research (PaCER) program is a one-year experiential-based qualitative health research learning program under the academic and scientific direction of Dr. Maria Santana and Dr. Paul Fairie of the University of Calgary Person-Centred Care Team. In 2024, PaCER teams and alumni were able to share highlights of the PaCER program as well as the many innovative PaCER projects at the <u>Gothenburg Global Conference on Person-Centred Care 2024</u>; <u>Canadian Healthcare Navigation Conference (CHNC) 2024</u>; <u>American Heart Association Annual Conference 2024</u>; <u>2024 SPOR Northwest Collaborative Forum</u> and others.

We have also enjoyed some publications about PaCER projects – see publication list <u>here</u>. There are currently four PaCER project-based manuscripts under review (long COVID, Maternal Health, YYC Refugee Health and Seeing the Invisible Resiliency (STIR)) with another readying for submission (Healthcare Navigation in Alberta). The Fall 2023 teams (Healthcare Navigation in Alberta and Dementia Disrupters) concluded their projects this summer and the work from both projects is continuing forward.

### PACER HIGHLIGHTS CONT'D

The two Fall 2024 teams are finishing Course 1. We are looking forward to their novel and inclusive, person and community-centred work.

#### 'I See You' Team

Sponsor: Dr. Michael Goldfarb, Jewish General Hospital, Montreal, PQ.

Our research seeks to understand the barriers, facilitators, and motivations for Intensive Care Unit (ICU) patients, family members and caregivers to engage in research studies related to the ICU experience. The limited participation in these types of studies highlights a gap in patient engagement research that must be addressed. By exploring these experiences, we hope to foster a more supportive and inclusive research environment, improve patient and caregiver experience, and enhance outcomes for critically ill patients. Ultimately this work will contribute towards advocacy strategies and promote patient-oriented research (POR) in the ICU setting.

#### Team Niitsitapiiksi (Real People/Blackfoot People)


Our team is dedicated to learning and understanding the ways Indigenous communities are overcoming substance and alcohol addictions by using traditional Blackfoot frameworks and methodologies to identify the possible solutions to assist Blackfoot community members overcome addictions. We aim to highlight culturally grounded strategies, community resilience, and innovative approaches that promote healing, inspiration, and long-term recovery. This work is vital because addiction has disproportionately impacted Indigenous populations, often as a direct result of historical trauma, systemic inequalities, and disruptions to cultural connections.

#### **Team Aapahsupii (Buffalo Seekers)**

This teams hope to focus on an Indigenous 'culture as wellness' approach to life promotion in Indigenous communities and people. Using culturally grounded and strengths based Indigenous research methodologies and knowledge frameworks the team will look to learn and understand ways culture, community, language, Elders, land and Indigenous ways of knowing and knowledge sharing are integral to holistic health and wellness in Indigenous life promotion.








# Patient-Centred Care (PCC) Forum

# DIGITAL STORYTELLING HIGHLIGHTS

#### **Indigenous Grandmothers' Stories**

In February 2024, Sandra and Sadia were invited by University of Alberta researchers Sarah Demedeiros and Stephanie Montesanti to lead a digital storytelling workshop with Indigenous Grandmothers. The workshop focused on restoring and strengthening healthy Indigenous family systems. Sandra and Sadia travelled to Edmonton for a full day of in-person relationship-building with the Grandmothers and the research team.

Over the following weeks, they supported each Grandmother in completing their digital stories online. Once all the stories were finished, they reconvened in person at Kihcihkaw Askî - Sacred Land to celebrate each Grandmother's story and reflect on the process.

#### **Presentations**

Sandra and Sadia presented their digital storytelling work at various local and international conferences and events. Sandra delivered an oral presentation at the Global Person-Centred Care Conference in Gothenburg, Sweden. Both Sandra and Sadia presented at the Person-Centred Care Forum in Calgary and the ISOQOL conference in Cologne, Germany.
