<u>Treaty 7</u> was signed on Sept. 22, 1877, between the Government of Canada and five First Nations: the Siksika (Blackfoot), Kainai (Blood), Piikani (Peigan), Stoney-Nakoda, and Tsuut'ina (Sarcee).

- Join Kiipitakyoyis (Grandmother's Lodge), in the UCalgary Faculty of Social Work on Sept. 22 for an informative lunch and learn to mark <u>Treaty 7 Day</u>. Discussion will include events leading up to the making of Treaty 7, the challenges of language barriers and differing worldviews during treaty "negotiations", the differing perspectives of Canada and the Nations with respect to the meaning of Treaty 7, and the struggle to have the original spirit and intent of Treaty 7 honoured by settler governments. Attend in person on main campus or over Zoom.
- The David Suzuki Foundation has 5 short and informative videos on <u>Treaty</u>
 <u>Promises</u> including: Treaty making, Interpreting and Understanding Treaties, and Implementing Treaties

Sept. 30 is <u>National Day for Truth and Reconciliation</u> / <u>Orange Shirt Day</u>, a day to learn and reflect about the history and intergenerational impact of Canada's Indian Residential School System, to recognize that Every Child Matters and a day to come together in the spirit of hope and reconciliation.  Intergenerational Healing Journey, either in-person at the Foothills Medical Centre or
 virtually. Elder Darryl Brass will share his reflections on intergenerational impacts of
 residential schools and intergenerational healing, as well as Truth and Reconciliation in
 present day healthcare.
- Sept. 24, 12:00- 1:00 pm MT: Gord Downie & Chanie Wenjack Fund presents the first of its
 four-part reconciliation week series highlighting the 10th anniversary of Canada's Truth and
 Reconciliation Commission, <u>Ten Years Later: Remembering the Truth</u>. Stream live on the

Opportunities and Award Nominations

The deadline of Sept. 24 is fast approaching to nominate UCalgary members, teams, and units for the <u>University of Calgary Teaching Awards</u>. Categories include <u>Indigenous Ways of Knowing</u> and <u>Inclusive Excellence</u>. Criteria and details <u>here</u>

The **2025 Newcomer Research Symposium** takes place on Nov. 14 in Calgary. This year's theme, *Living Knowledge with Newcomers*, broadens how community-centred research is conducted, shared, and validated. Deadline to submit a proposal for the symposium (workshop, panel discussion, poster, artistic expression, paper presentation) is Sept. 30.

The 2025 internal selection process for the **Robbins-Ollivier Award for Excellence in Equity** is now open until Oct. 6. The objective of the award is not to fund research in equity, diversity and inclusion disciplines, but rather to fund initiatives to be implemented within the institution to identify and/or address systemic barriers. The award provides a total of \$100,000 over one year, with the potential for a one-year no-cost extension. More details here.

Nominations are now open for the <u>Cumming School of Medicine Alumni of Distinction Awards</u> in recognition of outstanding contributions in three categories: service, education, and research. Nominations of alumni who have diverse backgrounds and experiences are encouraged. Submission deadline: Oct. 10.

Funding applications are now open for Heritage Canada's Anti-Hate Call that funds initiatives to address and prevent hate in Canada to empower communities to prevent and address hate by fostering inclusion, resilience, and unity through community-led, intersectional projects that will contribute to reducing social isolation and fragmentation, and reinforce collective identity, building a more inclusive, socially cohesive and united Canada. Deadline to submit is Oct. 22.

Autistic researchers are invited to join a <u>registry for Autistic Autism Researchers</u>, maintained by the <u>AIDAN</u> (Autism, Neurodiversity and Academic Achievement) Lab at UAlberta. The directory will highlight Autistic researchers from diverse fields and provide opportunities for connection, such as research collaborations or student supervision.
