Resident Presentation Guidelines - Pediatric Respiratory Medicine

Ugh. Another presentation.

We know that you are quite busy in residency, and that preparing presentations can be daunting. However, they are also an excellent opportunity to delve into a topic and solidify learning. The Respirology Fellows have created the following guideline to facilitate preparing your presentation.

Royal College Objectives Assessed:

- Pose a scholarly question
- Conduct a systematic search for evidence
- Apply the principles of critical appraisal to address a clinical question
- Demonstrate the ability to give an effective lecture or presentation

Topic Selection:

Your presentation should focus on a clinical question, and present the evidence used to guide management choices / evaluation strategies. Ideally, this Respirology topic will be relevant to practice in general pediatrics. It may often come from a question that you encounter in clinic or on the consult team. We are assessing your ability to formulate a question, find the evidence to answer it, and present your findings to the group!

Examples of topics include:

- How does exercise impact asthma?
- Why are long-acting beta-agonists used in pediatric asthma? Are they safe?
- Are parental reports of wheezing accurate and useful?
- When should laryngomalacia be surgically managed?

Please do not select a topic overview.

When:

Your presentation will occur as part of the Respirology academic half-day, usually during the third or fourth week of your rotation. Please review your schedule for the precise date.

Other:

Please plan to briefly review your presentation with one of the Respirology fellows on the Monday preceding your presentation (you can ask any of us; we all want to ensure your presentation goes well!).
