Storage: Once the insulin cartridge is started, it should be kept in the pen at room temperature. Most insulin expires after 1 month in the pen (42 days for levemir), and the cartridge should be changed if not used up by then. For safety, please remember to carry treatment for low blood sugars, such as glucose tablets. For more information, see the handout "Low Blood Sugar" from Alberta Health Services.

Insulin Injection Instructions

Take the dose of each insulin at the time indicated on the front of this handout.

Please be careful to not mix up your insulins, or take the wrong insulin at the wrong time.

Refer to the handout "Low Blood Sugar" from Alberta Health Services for more details.

Each time you take insulin:

- 1. Wash your hands
- 2. Mix the insulin gently rolling or tipping the pen 20 times (N insulin or NPH only).
- 3. Put on a **new** needle tip every time.
- 4. Do an air shot of 2 units. Repeat, if necessary, until you see insulin come out the end of the needle. If this is a new cartridge, the air shot may need to be done 2 or 3 times.
- 5. Dial the dose of insulin to be injected.
- 6. Insert the needle into fat tissue at ~90 degrees.
- 7. Press the plunger and hold the needle in for about 10 seconds.
- 8. Pull the needle straight out.
- 9. Remove the pen needle from the pen, and dispose in a sharps container.

Monitoring your blood sugars

Check your blood sugars as directed.
